What's Happening in December?

There are lots of special things happening throughout December. We have the usual special services and one-off events, such as Carol Services and Carols on the Green. There will also be special activities at each of our regular groups, such as Christmas parties for children's and youth groups, and there will be some special carol singing around the piano during the final Light Café before Christmas. But, here are a few extra details of a few of the special events that are coming up:

Carols on the Green takes place just along the road from the Councillor Lane Post Office (near to Cheadle Chippy). It takes place in the open air and lasts for about half an hour. We sing verses from a range of carols, tell the Christmas story through some set readings and everybody is welcome. (Carol sheets are provided.)

Fun at Christmas is an idea that came after a very well attended Fun Day in the summer. Because of the pandemic we had not been able to meet together for large community activities for some time. Those who came to the Fun Day really enjoyed it and so we wanted to do something again at Christmas. There will be Christmas fun available for all the family.

Carols by Candlelight is being held a week earlier than usual this year because Sunday 18th is the day of the Men's Football World Cup Final (and we just know that some people will want to stay at home especially if England are playing). As with every service at All Hallows, this very special service is open for anybody of any age to attend, but do be aware it isn't specifically aimed at children.

Nativity Family Service will take place the following Sunday (also swapped due to the World Cup Final). Tea-towel head scarves will be available and there will be a part to play for any child who is present and wants to be involved, even if they just turn up on the day. There's even going to be some singing for everybody, with new words to some old favourite Christmas songs.

Blue Christmas Service is a special service for those who like Christmas, but find the razzmatazz of the season difficult for a variety of reasons. This is a simple, calm and gentle service that is full of hope and has been a real source of comfort for many in recent years.

Christingle Service lasts for about half an hour on Christmas Eve and is a great way to start Christmas. You don't need to bring anything as everything will be provided. As the sun goes down on Christmas Eve this is a 'magical' service for many.

Christmas Day Family Service actually falls on a Sunday this year, but it will be the same type of service that it is any other year. We get to see some of the children's presents and join in their excitement, and Holy Communion is available after the main service for those who would like to receive it. 

Sleepers Wake: Getting Serious About Climate Change

In our morning services throughout Advent we are using a book called 'Sleepers Wake' as a basis for our sermon series. It helps us to consider some of the ways in which we each impact the environment.

And being realistic we can probably all see that our environmental impact increases at this time of year. Not just because it is winter, but because it is Christmas. We celebrate the birth of Jesus in special ways (as we should), but we should also try to be a little more aware of the environmental impact that our celebrations are having and reduce it.

This is a journey we have been on as a family over the past few years and we definitely have more steps to take. But we realised that many of our own Christmas family traditions we wouldn't be so happy with at other times of the year. So, we have decided to keep looking at what new changes we can make each year. Maybe your household could look at how your celebrations impact the environment too, and try to take some steps to improve that each year.



There are a number of great websites which have suggestions to help us to have a greener Christmas. Maybe you could do some of these:

1. Buy less quantity but more quality presents (don't buy lots of things that people are not going to use after Christmas).

2. Look at buying 'Alternative Gifts' such as an experience or paying for something for a community in a poor area of the world.

3. Look at what the gifts are made from and how they got here. Are they made from sustainable products and did those who picked them / made them get a fair wage?

4. Try wrapping presents in paper that can be recycled, and use less tape.

5. Cut food waste. (What is it with people shopping like the shops are closed for weeks in the build up to Christmas?) One of the biggest causes of carbon in the atmosphere is food waste.

6. Eat seasonally, as a traditional Christmas Dinner would be anyway.

7. Meet up with family and friends a lot. This will mean that less houses need to be heated.

8. Don't buy extra things that you don't actually need. (One of the biggest threats to the environment is that everybody constantly wants more stuff).

I could give you more ideas but I don't want this to feel like a list of things that we should not be doing. The important thing is that we each identify as much as possible what the impact of our celebrations are and that we go on the journey to minimise that impact. But, why is this so important?

The Prophet Isaiah wrote about God's coming Messiah and said that he will reign with justice and righteousness.

We are realising more and more that issues to do with the environment truly are issues of climate justice. Our actions impact other people in other parts of the world. The way of Jesus is the way of justice and so we should not abandon the way of Jesus ever - especially at Christmas time.

So, let's have a great Christmas and let us be a people of justice, as we follow the Messiah.

Kintsugi Hope

In the early months of 2023 we will be looking at the themes from the Kintsugi Hope course in our morning Sunday services. We are also looking to host a weekly group.



Discovering treasure in life's scars

'Kintsugi' is a Japanese technique for

repairing pottery, where instead of trying to hide the cracks the pieces are fixed together with seams of gold - making the object more beautiful.

Kintsugi Hope Wellbeing Groups are safe and supportive spaces where people can talk about the cracks in their mental health that they live with. Topics include disappointment, loss, anxiety, perfectionism, shame and so much more.

A free 12-week course will be available, although days and times are yet to be confirmed. A separate a 7-week course for teenagers can be made available too if requested. More information will be available towards the start of 2023.

First Time Here?

If it's your first time here then welcome! It's great to have you with us. Here are a few short notes that you might find helpful.

Fill in a Communication Card - Drop it in the box on the Welcome Desk in the foyer or give it to the service leader on the way out. Please use it to ask questions, offer feedback or request prayer.

We don't expect guests to give - For those who are members or regular attenders of our churches there is usually an offering, but we don't ask our guests for any money.

We have a Loop System - Switch your hearing aid to T-coil. You might find it useful to sit towards the middle.

Hang around afterwards - Come and join us for a cup of tea or fresh coffee, and for a chat.

Prayer Ministry - If you would like somebody to pray with you about something for yourself or somebody that you know then there are people who would love to do so after the service. Please make yourself known to the service leader.

DECLARE YOUR FAITH THROUGH BAPTISM


If you feel you've made a commitment to God but have never been baptised, then this could be a great step for you.
