Good St. Nicholas

Saint Nicholas was a Christian man, who became a priest and then a bishop in what we now call Turkey. His parents died when he was young. They were said to have been very wealthy and he inherited their fortune. This, coupled with Nicholas' desire to follow the teachings of Jesus and be kind to the poor meant that he ultimately gave away their fortune to those who were in need.

There are a number of stories and legends as to how that took place, which historians are less confident in saying are historically factual. However, they do tell the story of a kind and generous Christian leader who saw what he owned as something given to him by God which he could then go on and bless those in greater need with.

The story and legend of St. Nicholas spread across Europe over the centuries and his name got slightly changed due to the languages and accents who spoke it. St Nicholas became Sinterklaas in northern European countries, and then when some of those people emigrated to the now English speaking United States his name changed slightly again to Santa Claus. And it all starts with a kind bishop who's heart is to use what he has to bless those in greater need.

As I think about the way that we treat St. Nicholas in the Western World I realise that we have actually turned the legend on its head so much. We have taken a fabulous story about giving to those in need into something about receiving things for ourselves. Of course, gifts to each other are good things and should be celebrated. But, if our Christmas celebrations become about what we receive or what those closest to us receive as opposed to who we can help then we have totally missed the point.

And then there is the greatest sense of giving at Christmas, from someone's riches to bless those with significantly less. Jesus was already God the Son in heaven before he was born. He came into the world by his own choice, living as one of us, showing and teaching us the best ways to live and then giving his life for us so that our sins can be forgiven. This is all about giving rather than receiving. Jesus is the ultimate model of this and St. Nicholas followed the example of the Lord whom he served.

I wonder this Christmas, who could you bless in some great and significant way? How might you and your family approach things differently in order to be a blessing to those in greater need? Would you be willing to forego something and give that money to a worthy charity for instance? That would definitely be in keeping with the model that Jesus gives to those who follow him.

Discover your winter wonderland

Looking for a fun Christmas day out? Wrapping up warm and going out for a winter stroll is a great way to spend time as a family and get in the Christmas mood. Whether gazing at your local Christmas lights or exploring areas of natural beauty, there are plenty of free

places decked out for Christmas. Local parks can feature festive decor and some may have special Christmas nature trails, which can be a wonderful activity to do with the children. First Time Here?

If it's your first time here then welcome! It's great to have you with us. Here are a few short notes that you might find helpful.

Relax - You're our guest, so make yourself at home. If there is anything that you would like to know then ask one of the Welcome Team by the front door.

We don't expect guests to give - For those who are members or regular attenders there is an offering plate at the back, but we don't ask our guests for any money.

We have a Loop System - Switch your hearing aid to T-coil.

You might find it useful to sit towards the middle.

Hang around afterwards - Come and join us for a cup of tea or fresh coffee, and for a chat—drinks are served in the hall and we usually gather in the lounge to chat.

Prayer - If you would like someone to pray with you — either prayer for you or for someone you know — there are people who would love to do so after the service. Please make yourself known to the service leader.

Children & Youth - Once a month, the whole church worships together. On other weeks, there is a Sunday School for primary aged children. One of the Welcome Team can show you where Sunday School meets. For pre-school age children, there are green tables at the side of church with activities. Please don't be embarrassed if your children make any noise—they are welcome here and are part of the service, too! All our children and youth leaders have DBS checks and have undergone safeguarding training.

If you're not in one, there are a number of groups that meet in homes throughout the week to get to know each other better, look at the Bible and pray together.


BE PART OF THE MISSION
